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

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# \$84,563 raised — The Big Give Individual Donor Campaign wraps up

any thanks to all who contributed online and sent checks for our annual donor campaign, The Big Give. It was fun to watch the individual fundraising challenge unfold in real time on the AVA's peer to peer giving page. # Important action at AVA Board Meeting

s some of you may know, or may not have known, I served as the Chairperson of the AVA Club Charges Special Committee. The Committee report was presented in October to the AVA Board of Directors, who did act on the Committee's recommendations. I am providing you with a summary of the Committee report and the Board's action, because it affects your planning for the coming year.

First some background on the charges paid by clubs to the AVA. The current \$1.25 participation fee and \$3 registration fee was implemented in 2003, which was 20 years ago. Since that time, due to inflation, the value of \$3 has increased to \$4.98, and the value of \$1.25 has increased to \$2.08.

Operating expenses have also experienced a similar increase over the same period for the same reason. Yet, we continued to pay the AVA \$1.25. Consequently, since about 2010, the AVA budget has been forecasting an operating loss during non-convention years, which impacts the support provided to the clubs by the National Office, despite The Big Give and budget cuts. This situation is not sustainable for the survival of the AVA. The actions recommended by the committee should have been taken years ago, and simply could no longer be kicked down the road.

After reviewing the AVA's sources of funding derived by charges to the clubs, the committee determined the best course of action was to recommend that the AVA Board increase the participant fee payable to the AVA from \$1.25 to \$2 for all participants at all AVA sanctioned events. This was adopted by the Board. Note that the wording of this recommendation refers to "all" participants, which includes the "free walker category." It will be the club's decision how best to cover the cost of "free walkers," who should now be considered guests. This action takes effect on January 1, 2024.

The Committee further recommended that the \$3 registration fee be increased to a "recommended no more than registration fee of \$4." In addition, a \$4 registration fee will be

At our board meeting at the Freedom Walks October 18 and 19, the board confirmed its Strategic Plan Vision 2025 Recommendations. We did not recommend that we should just let the organization die. We strongly supported and affirmed goals we must focus on to achieve in the next two years. They include continuing the great work being done by the Membership Committee to modernize our membership model; to work to achieve a sustainable funding model;

to continue to investigate what's required for an App for our phones; and to continue to explore a new board model. We do not intend to give up on our purpose – to promote the public health, physical fitness and well being of Americans.

We also heard from our Club Charges Special Committee. There is a great synopsis of the committee's recommendations and the board's decisions on pages 1 and 3 of this *TAW*.

And this brings me to the *TAW* itself. As you are aware, this is the last edition of The American Wanderer that will come out in newspaper format, created and edited by our own Donna Seline. Donna has been creating and overseeing the TAW for more years than I have been involved. She has required well-done articles, written in a way that is consistent with good journalism. And, she has always encouraged us to participate in this official newspaper and tell others about the walks, festivals, activities and people that make our organization great. The TAW has been the place to look to see what is happening in other parts of the country, and to advertise what's happening near to home. Thank you, Donna. You are a super-AVA hero. This American Wanderer is dedicated to you!

Thanks to all of you. Wherever you are this winter, get out and walk, ski, showshoe, move and keep going. And encourage others to do the same. I hope to see you on the trail.

charged to all registrants on the Online Start Box. However, clubs are free to determine their own registration fee for all events not on the Online Start Box, based upon the actual value of the event added by the club and other charges such as park fees. This was adopted by the Board and takes effect on January 1, 2024.

The bottom line for your club's 2024 planning is clubs will be charged \$2 for each participant at your AVA sanctioned events, and the fee for registration through the OSB will be \$4 with \$2 going to the AVA and \$2 going to the club. Clubs may use their discretion to determine registration fees for their events not hosted on the OSB, and to determine how best to come up with the funds to cover the \$2 participation fee for guests, formerly referred to as "free walkers." You may expect additional details and guidance in the November and December editions of the Checkpoint, as well as from your Regional Directors.



They introduced him to Volkssports in a village along the Rhine River, then proceeded to coax him into a new travel concept of blending Volkswalking and sightseeing.

Our new walking friends seemed just as eager to walk in new countries abroad. In the mid-1990s, we introduced walking tours in Australia/New Zealand. The Asian countries of China, Korea and Japan really stretched us in 2002. Central and South America (Costa Rica, Chile, Bolivia, Peru) were amazing in 2003. Southern Africa was a big step in 2006. Antarctica in 2009 rounded out all seven continents.

In the interim, we've shared Volkssport and the magical blend of travel and walking in nearly 80 countries and all 50 states. What an incredible journey it has been!


# Labyrinths and music new AVA Special Programs along 135

Colorado River Walkers Volkssport Club, Austin, Texas., is happy to announce that our nine YREs have many qualifiers for these two new AVA Special Programs, starting in January 2024.

There are labyrinths on the Austin Capitol YRE and the Lady Bird Lake YRE. Also, our Pflugerville, Cedar Park, Round Rock and Salado YREs all pass beautiful labyrinths.

The new Step to the Beat AVA Special Program honors the world's love of music in its many forms. We have found music schools, music store, and musical event venues in






All three YREs in Austin have a musical qualifier on the route. The famous Austin Continental Club (pictured left), started in 1955, is on the Austin Fairview YRE route. Pflugerville, Round Rock and Salado YREs all have musical stores, schools or venues on the routes.

We expect to have many Winter Texans try our interesting Volkssport walks, as they travel I35 on their way to warmer places during the winter months. Go to our website, coloradoriverwalkers.org, where our webmistress, Stephanie, has placed more information and photos on each YRE. Look under Menu and then under Year Round Events. Enjoy!

### AVA Special Program — The Appalachian Trail

Runs January 1, 2018 through December 31, 2028. Redeem books by December 31, 2029. The Appalachian National Scenic Trail is roughly 3,500 km long and goes through 14 states from Springer Mountain in Georgia to Mount Katahdin in Maine. Walkers must hike/walk a section of the trail in each state. A qualifying AVA walk is one that goes on the AT or a blue-blazed trail for at least 4k and will count for only one state; the sponsoring club will determine which one. Complete 14 required events. Each AVA stamp can only appear once in the book. Due to the unique nature of this program, partici-



pants have space in the program book to add a picture, notes, and other local stamps such as the park or AT Passport stamp. The patch is 4x6". For details and books, contact Susan Medlin, 15464 Culebra Rd, Lot 53, San Antonio, TX 78253, 210-325-3523 or email sueammed@aol.com.

### **AVA Special Program — Border Crossings**

Runs January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2023. The participant must physically cross the border from one state to another while on a Volkssport event. Walking, swimming, biking and cross-country ski events all count. Borders between counties do not count unless they are in different states. International borders will count as long as they are part of an IVV event. Submit a photo of your border crossing making it a personal mini photo album or keep notes to make it a mini journal of your adventures in your passport. You may do the same border crossing on 15 different days by dressing up in different clothes, wear a different hat, carry a stuffed animal,



toy, etc; in each photo. Walk 15 sanctioned events. Patch: 3"x4". Sponsored by the Michigan Pathfinders, Tom Crabill, 725 Lake Drive, Coldwater, MI 49036 tjcrabill@comcast.net, 260-409-1659.

### AVA Special Program – Great Lakes, Great Fun, Great Fitness, Great Friendships

Runs January 1, 2021to December 31, 2023. To complete this program, you must walk 12 sanctioned events which travels along a Great Lake; or on, beside or inside a street, building, city, school or any other "physical thing" with a Great Lake name associated with it. Great Lakes are Huron, Erie, Superior, Ontario and Michigan. Examples of qualifiers would be Huron Street, Ontario City, Erie Canal



or anything that uses one of the five names. The logbook requires three separate Great Lake names to be included in the 12 events. Each qualifier can only be used once in the logbook, or once in a year, whichever comes first. Upon completion, participants will receive a string backpack with the program's logo and an option to purchase an event patch. # Twenty-five years to finish 50 states

I was in the U.S. Army, stationed in Germany in 1977 and was introduced to Volksmarching there. I left Germany in 1979 with 50 events and 500 KM completed never expecting to do another Volksmarch. In 1983 there was an article in Time magazine about a Volksmarch in Fort Devens, Massachusetts. So, I dragged my wife 400 miles to her first Volksmarch. After that we joined a series of upstate New York clubs, and after several club consolidations finally became members of the Niagara Frontier Volkssport Club (NFVC) based out of Clarence (Buffalo), New

We did not buy the 50 state books until 1998. We completed the nearby states in the next two years walking with the NFVC. I was in the Army Reserve and they sent me places in the U.S. near walks, which I did when I was off duty. By 2000 I had completed six states, my wife had completed four.

In 2006 we planned to go to Hawaii for our 25th wedding anniversary, and we planned to do a walk there. It would only be my seventh state and Wendy's fifth. We went three days before our cruise and walked Diamond Head. This trip was an outline to planning our other states trips. Each time we took a vacation we planned to do a walk in some far away state.

We did Nevada on a trip to the Grand Canyon. Alaska on a cruise. South Dakota, Wyoming and Utah on a trip whose goal was to do the Crazy Horse Memorial walk. We walked a weekend event held by the Maine and Massachusetts clubs and completed Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and Connecticut on the way. We took a cruise through the Panama Canal and completed Washington and Oregon before the cruise, and Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada (yes that does not count for the U.S. but it's a U.S. Volksmarch), California, on the cruise and Florida after the cruise.

Our son graduated from Infantry Basic at Fort Benning, Georgia and we did Alabama and Georgia while we were there. In 2016 the AVA celebrated their 40th anniversary and clubs had walks honoring that. We walked four more states in the Midwest to get that patch. We walked with the Nebraska Wander Freunde Trailblazers Club at their 2017 Solar Eclipse walk and finished four states on that trip.

Our daughter got married in Arizona in 2019 so we stopped in Colorado and New Mexico to get those states on the way to the wedding. We had completed Arizona in 2013 visiting her before she was married. We did river cruises up the east coast, down the Mississippi and on the Columbia and Snake Rivers to complete seven more states.

To finish the 50 states, as the books are getting a little worn after 25 years and wet once, we did two trips this year just to do Oklahoma, Texas, Minnesota and North Dakota. Our last state was Minnesota, a one day event in Maplewood, Minnesota, with the Twin City Volkssports. Nice that the club scheduled that one just for us!

We got to visit places we probably would never have gone to on a regular vacation. Doing walks from cruises took some planning. Local clubs helped giving advice as to where the ships docked, and where the course ran so you could see if a walk from the boat without transportation was feasible. The advent of the online start box also helped as a lot more information about routes could be obtained from the internet.

# Lee Lepus Volksverband president retires after 37 years

In the early 1970s Dee Platt walked her first Volksmarch in Germany. It was cold, raining, muddy and just miserable. That did not stop her; the family routinely walked two and three Volksmarches every weekend for the next five years. When they returned to the states in 1978 after five years in Germany the last tour, total of 11 years, they believed their weekends of walking several Volksmarches were over. They did not know Volksmarching had crossed the ocean and was now in the states. She discovered there was a Volksmarch club in Virginia Beach, about 2½ hours away, and took the family to a walk. The president of that club, The Gator Volksmarsch Club, helped the Platt family start a local club at Fort Lee, Virginia.

served until 1984 when she was elected president. Somewhere along that time she was divorced and remarried, changing her name to Schrum. She resigned as president in 2021 at the age of 80. Dee has served as president for 37 years. In all this time, she has missed only one meeting, and no LLV club Volksmarches. Volksmarching has been her life.

Most of our awards and patches have been designed by Dee to include several memorial patches dedicated to members who have died. The first Year Round Event (YRE) from Legend Brewery was not a Capitol event — that special program did not yet exist. Lee Lepus has hosted the Richmond, Virginia, Capitol event since 1994; there has always been an

On July 9, 1979, Lee Lepus Volksverband became the 27th club in the United States and the second club in Virginia. Their first event was held at Fort Lee, Virginia, November 3-4, 1979. The second event was held at Fort Lee May 3-4, 1980, and was the first marathon walk in the United States. Since Volksmarching was so new in the states there were no rules in place to conduct any Volksmarch at the time, there was no one to tell the club they could not conduct a marathon, so they did.

Dee has served as an officer, either secretary or president, almost the entire time except for a short time when taking a class at John Tyler Community College. She was elected Secretary August 31, 1979, and

award patch for this event and Dee has designed these patches.

Dee is a lifetime member of Lee Lepus as well as American Volkssport Association. She is point of contact for the club's YRE at Pocahontas State Park in Chesterfield County, Virginia, just 10 minutes from her home. She is also back walking again after falling down three steps in 2020 and doing serious damage to her left leg. She was told she's lucky she didn't lose her leg. She finally completed her 50 States and 51 State Capitols in February 2023. At this time she has completed more than 1800 events and a distance of over 18,000 km. You will still be seeing her on the trail, enjoying her retirement and freedom to just walk.

Germanna was a German settlement established in 1714 near that area. A junior college was established close to the original settlement and took Germanna as its name. If people recognize the name Germanna at all, they most likely associate it with this college. Additionally, "Volkssport" is not a word that is in everyone's vocabulary. The name change made it very clear that our club is centered in Fredericksburg and walking is what we do. The interest in the club immediately increased.

Another reason our club is growing is because we recognized that many people want to walk frequently and really enjoy walking with other club members. Consequently, FWC members started planning and scheduling group walks for most weekends. The walks are generally 5k or more, and one member of the club is the walk coordinator and leader. The walks



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# Louisiana Explorers finishing the 64 parishes

Next year, 2024, our quest to walk all 64 Louisiana parishes will be complete with YREs scheduled for the last eight parishes in southeast Louisiana. What began in 2018 as a project of adding walks in seven new parishes will now become history. Each year

we traveled to another section of the state and held walks in 6-12 different locations. And now, finally in 2024, we will have walks in the last eight parishes. All but two of the walks (Chalmette and LaPlace) are on the west side of the Mississippi River on a 150 mile route.

We will be holding special group walks January 11-15 during the MLK weekend. Early arrivers on Thursday, January 11 can join us for a modified route of the New

Orleans Garden District at 9:30 a.m., and then continue 10 miles east to the Chalmette Battlefield, site of the Battle of New Orleans. The battlefield is part of the Jean Lafitte National Historic Park. We will gather at 2 p.m. for a tour the battlefield and cemetery along the banks of the Mississippi and a portion of the residential and town area. Chalmette is the parish seat of St. Bernard Parish.

Our Friday walks will be in Gretna at 8:30 a.m. and Belle Chasse at 1:30 p.m. Gretna is the parish seat of Jefferson Parish, named for Thomas Jefferson. The town was originally part of a 1750 plantation, and was formally incorporated in 1836. Belle Chasse is the largest community in Plaquemines Parish and sits on the southwest bank of the Mississippi.

Saturday at 8:30 a.m., we will explore the Barataia National Nature Preserve, another part of the Jean Lafitte National Historic Park in Jefferson Parish. The trail consists of boardwalks and nature trails and in the warmer months of the year, alligators can be seen along with other

wildlife. I sometimes have trouble finding one interesting site with enough distance for a walk in a parish, but Jefferson Parish had two great places, Gretna and Barataria. After our nature hike, we head to Luling in St Charles Parish for a walk

through a residential area, passing city and school facilities below the bridge connecting Luling to the New Orleans area.

Sunday, we head to LaPlace which is the southern terminus of I-55 in St. John the Baptist Parish for a 9 a.m. walk before heading to Houma in Terrebonne Parish for a 2:30 p.m. walk.

And finally on Monday, it's on to Thibobaux in Lafource Parish. The walk starts at the Jean Lafitte National Historic Park Wetlands Cultural Center (yes, another Lafitte site) visitor center and explores the many historic buildings and cemeteries. And lastly, a walk along the Mississippi River levee in St. James Parish across from Oak Alley Plantation and several other plantations.

# Saint Louis Walkers' Total Solar Eclipse Walk - April 8, 2024

Join Saint Louis Walkers in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, to walk a 5k/10k on Total Solar Eclipse Day, April 8, 2024. Cape Girardeau is almost in the exact center of the eclipse path with one of the longest viewing windows in the United States: four minutes, six seconds. The eclipse begins at 12:40 p.m. and peaks at 2 p.m.

We're registering walkers early in the morning at Cape Girardeau SportsPlex, 2526 Jim Drury Way, just off I-55. This is Cape's official viewing area. Park at SportsPlex early, before the crowd arrives. Our walk starts from there. Walk, then settle in your comfy lawn chairs or grab a bleacher seat, enjoy lunch from the food trucks, and wait for the eclipse to start. Don't forget to bring your eclipse glasses. You will see the sun's corona and the bright spot of sunlight called the diamond in the crown. It's spectacular and unforgettable!

We suggest that you book a hotel room in St. Louis, which is less than two hours from Cape Girardeau, straight down I-55. Hotels in the eclipse path are raising their room rates astronomically to match this astronomical phenomenon. St. Louis is near the path, but will only see a partial eclipse. The next total solar eclipse in the U.S. will be in 2044. Go to our website, saintlouiswalkers.com, for updates on this walk.



### AVA Special Program – Step to the Beat

Program runs January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026. Redeem completed books by December 31, 2027. This program encompasses the world's love of music in its many forms. To qualify, a walker must pass by any location that teaches music, has music performances reg-



ularly on stage, uses vocal or instrumental music to entertain audiences, has dancing performed to music or a music store. Qualifiers are 15 different locations in an AVA sanctioned event. The qualifying location can only be used once per event even if there are multiple qualifiers on the same route. If an event has more than one qualifier on the event route, the stamp may be used again, if paid for and walked a separate time for each qualifier. This special program supports "Hungry for Music" which is a charitable nonprofit organization that works to support music education and cultural enrichment and provides musical instruments to underprivileged children around the world. In September his annual physical tests came back with some problems which would require retesting four weeks later. Unfortunately on September 21 he got very sick requiring a trip to the emergency room where they were not able to save him. I miss Rudy very much as do the Volkssporters who saw him along the walk trails. It is very difficult to lose a pet you get so attached to like a close friend or relative.



### Long time Volksmarchers

My wife and I are long-time Volksmarchers, though we didn't start together. I had been in Germany previously from 1978-81 and the Air Force sent me back in 1983. I learned German on my first tour. The recreation center had a bus to the Darmstadt Volksfest in July, and it was only \$2. What a bargain! So I went on the walk. Afterwards they had an oompah band, great food and drink and lots of people.

In Germany, when you go to a walk, there are many tables filled with brochures of upcoming events. These people are called Werbers (advertisers). They would have a stack of flyers and an example of the award for the walk. The awards ranged from medals to beer mugs to plates to cloth patches and all sorts of things. If you are pre-registered, you were guaranteed an award. Walking clubs would sign up and estimate how many of their members would come to the walk.

I joined the Rhein-Main Panthers Volksmarch Club. A year later I became president and suggested we host a walk. We had to go to the Deutscher Volkssport Verband (DVV) meeting to request our walk dates. A club could only have a walk on a date when there were no other walks within 75km. We chose Memorial Day weekend. There were no other walks in Germany that weekend that were anywhere close. We had 3500 walkers the first year and 5000 the second year.

We walked in five countries together. I also went on a walking bus/train tour in England, Scotland, and the Shetland Islands in 1987 organized by a retired British soldier, Dennis Coulson. I took trains from Frankfurt, Germany to Kent, England to meet up with the group. He had set up walks or connected with local clubs who hosted walks in many parts of England.

I left Germany in 1987 for Montgomery, Alabama. I joined the Capital City Wanderers and there weren't many walks in the U.S. at that time. We carpooled to Georgia, New Orleans or Florida for walks. After three years in Alabama, I was assigned to San Vito Air Base, Italy. This base is way down on the heal of the boot in the state of Puglia. No



walks anywhere near us. I was working in recreation division running the rec center, the base pool and eventually running outdoor recreation. My job was to offer things for military and civilians to do when they weren't working. I investigated where walks were and got a military van booked to drive anyone interested in going on these walks. We hosted the AF Global event at San Vito in 1991.

I left active duty and moved to Ohio and started The Penny Pickers walking club in Yellow Springs. I was always picking up coins from the ground, hence the name. We offered walks, bikes and the first roller skating event in Ohio. We started offering bus trips with walks available every day.

In 1995 I went out to Portland, Oregon, to the AVA convention where I met Faith Cataldo on a walk. Somehow, we kept meeting up at the walks every day. Last evening at dinner, we were dancing, I asked if I could see her after the convention. Faith started walking in 1989 with the newly formed Maumee Valley Volkssporters, which was organized by George and Barbara Emrick. She and her family went on walks here and there.

When we got back home to Ohio, I would call her, and drive the 150+ miles (each way) to Maumee for a "date." After 11 months of this, I sold my house and moved to Maumee. I kept asking her to marry me, but she held off, for 12 years! When I was set to go to Iraq in 2008, she finally agreed to get hitched. We've been together now for 27 years. We've walked in all 50 states and many other countries.

### Woodland Wanderers, 2024



We suggest starting as early as possible, wearing a lot of sunscreen and carrying plenty of water. As an aside, our summer months are generally June through September, as opposed to Wyoming where it is next Wednesday.

We have the Capital, Deem Hills and Encanto events in Phoenix; Fountain Hills featuring the fountain shooting up 300 feet in the air for 15 minutes every hour; Lake Havasu City featuring the London Bridge; historic downtown Prescott; winter RV paradise Quartzsite; Chaparral Park in Scottsdale; the Sedona town walk and around Bell Rock; visit the Desert Caballeros Western Museum in Wickenburg; and in Surprise visit Sun City Grand, the Surprise Stadium and an actual waterfall in White Tank Mountain Regional Park.

In the planning stages during the Snow Bird Season are Traditional events for Pi day, Veterans Day, a Christmas light walking tour and New Year's Eve/Day.

Year Round Events, one in each county seat. Check out the website to download the free challenge booklet and brochure. 

The Texas Trail Roundup (TTR) will host four walk events this winter in San Antonio, Texas.

The first walk is the ninth annual Christmas Lights Walk on Sunday, December 10. The start is at the stately Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 76, 10 Tenth Street, San Antonio. This post is the oldest VFW Post in Texas. For more info online, go to vfwpost76ontheriverwalk.org/.

Famed Pulitzer prize-winning journalist Ernie Pyle once described the San Antonio River Walk as the "American Venice." Volkssporters will enjoy the serenity of the River Walk while guided by over 100,000 multi-colored lights draped over the towering bald cypress trees that line the river. You will also be awed by the beauty of the more than 2,000 luminarias along the river bank. Luminarias are a traditional Mexican Christmas lanterns lining the walkways along the river trail. # New Mexico County group walks April 11-15, 2024

The Sun Country Striders continues its series of New Mexico county group walks, April 11-15, 2024, with walks in East Central New Mexico. You can do the walks anytime, If you cannot make any of these dates, the walks will be Seasonal. The group walks will also be traveling walks, so hotel arrangements are still being made as of print deadline. Please check the AVA Facebook and Striders website for updates.

#### Among the areas you will walk:

Santa Rosa, New Mexico is designated "The Scuba Diving Capital of the Southwest" due to the Blue Hole, an 81-foot-deep natural artesian spring that—at 62 degrees—allows for year-round scuba diving. Located on the Pecos River, along Route 66, the city features picturesque stone buildings in the historic district.

Mosquero, New Mexico, is a small town, built around 1908 as a water stop for the Dawson Branch of the El Paso and Northeastern Railroad. It is the county seat of Harding County and is the least populated county in New Mexico.

Mills Canyon is part of the Cibola National Forest and the Kiowa National Grasslands. Pronghorn are prevalent. The terrain and vegetation change drastically when you approach the edge of Mills Canyon, which descends almost 1,000 feet to the Canadian River below.

established in 1835 after a group of settlers received a land grant from the Mexican government. During the railroad era Las Vegas boomed, quickly becoming one of the largest cities in the American Southwest. The railroad also brought notorious criminals of the time, including such legends as dentist Doc Holliday, and his girlfriend Big Nose Kate, Jesse James, Billy the Kid, Wyatt Earp, Hoodoo Brown and Handsome Harry the Dancehall Rustler.

Belen was originally named Nuestra Senora de Belen, the Spanish words for Our Lady of Bethlehem, in honor of the biblical Virgin Mary. The city is geographically near the center of New Mexico and has been a significant transportation hub for central New Mexico that includes access to rail, the interstate highway and air. Belen is 35 miles south of Albuquerque.

Socorro is home to New Mexico Tech, and is a city rich in science and technology. The Karl G. Jansky Very Large Array Radio Telescopes (where the movie *Contact* with Jodie Foster was filmed), and White Sands Missile Range attract scientists and engineers from around the world. Art, music, museums, hiking and much more abound in this city.

**Mountainair** is known as "The Gateway to Ancient Cities" because it still values its historic elements. The Salinas Pueblo Mission, as it is called



Fort Union National Monument is along the eroded Santa Fe Trail, with its adobe walled ruins of the largest 19th century military fort in the region. From 1851 to 1891, Fort Union functioned as an agent of change in the New Mexico Territory and throughout the Southwest.

**Tucumcari,** along Route 66, is a town where western hospitality meets the Mother Road. Prehistoric dinosaurs roamed the area (see the Dinosaur Museum), along with ancient Native Americans. Spanish and Western cultures collided with the railroad and Route 66.

Las Vegas, New Mexico, a historic city along the Santa Fe Trail, was

now, was around in the 1400s and had up to 20,000 residents. It still existed when it was colonized by the Spanish in 1561. Mountainair is located 10 miles from the geographic center of New Mexico.

Side trips can be made to the Kasha-Katuwe Tent Rocks National Monument, Santa Fe, Los Alamos, Albuquerque and other historic destinations.

There is a Meet & Greet on Friday, April 12, along with a group dinner Saturday, April 13. Details will be announced soon at suncountrystriders.wordpress.com.




